Saved from the ashes of Ossian's Hall



This 1878 watercolour of the interior of Penicuik House, Midlothian, is almost all that remains of one of the grandest rooms in Victorian Scotland. The Grand Saloon was known as Ossian's Hall on account of a ceiling painted by Alexander Runciman in the 1770s with scenes from the *Poems of Ossian*.

Sadly, Penicuik was reduced to a shell by fire in 1899 but the large Indo-French carpet that adorned the saloon floor survived. Originally brought back from Pondicherry by Edward Clerk (1824-1917) of the 4th Madras Cavalry as a gift for his father, it was sold by his descendants at Lyon & Turnbull in Edinburgh on February 11.



Coins and medals 'up 15-20%' during £53m year for London's salerooms

Despite the near absence of face-to-face trading, 2020 was a record year for London's coins and medals auction houses with combined total sales just shy of £53m.

The headline figure, published in this issue as part of ATG's annual survey of the capital's numismatic auction scene, represented a rise of more than 10% despite a 3.5%

fall in the number of lots offered. The market benefited from buyers having extra collecting time during the Covid-19 restrictions and what Spink (with sales of £9.9m) described as "a crossroads where the veteran collector meets the technologically savvy investor resulting in explosive auction results".

Pierce Noonan, CEO of Dix Noonan Webb (£13.6m), estimates that coins and medals increased in value by "around 15-20% on average across the board" in 2020.

The roller-coaster 12 months featured several auction landmarks, including a new record for any classical coin set by Roma Numismatics during an extraordinary year in which the firm almost doubled its year-on-year sales to £17.8m.

EU proposes ban on import and export of antique ivory

New proposals by the European Commission to prevent the commercial export and import of most antiques containing ivory have been described by The British Antique Dealers Association (BADA) as "hugely damaging and disproportionate".

On January 28, the EC published draft measures designed to control the sale of elephant ivory within member

states. Trade within the EU of ivory 'worked' prior to 1947 plus musical instruments made prior to 1975 will be permitted (with added paperwork and certificates required) but the sale of such items into and out of the EU will be banned.

BADA secretary general Mark Dodgson said: "The recommendation to prevent

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

UK-EU ivory laws will not directly overlap

the commercial export and import of most antiques containing ivory is both hugely damaging and disproportionate."

BADA and international trade association CINOA will be making submissions to the EC and Dodgson urged any person that trades with the EU to encourage contacts and clients to respond to the public feedback opportunity.

The draft law is subject to public consultation until February 25 and can be found online via https://atg.news/EUivoryfeedback

The proposals in Europe follow the passing of the Ivory Act 2018 in the UK that is expected to come into force later this year.

Charles Russell Speechlys, said it is this act that will probably have significantly more impact on most UK dealers, auctioneers and collectors.

"In short, with its very narrow exemptions the UK ban will be more stringent than that proposed by the EU," he said.

Maxwell added that once the UK law comes into effect it will prevent the export of most ivory from the UK to EU regardless of what form the new EU regulation takes when it comes into force.

Some of the EU proposals are long overdue. It is currently still possible to sell raw elephant tusks in some member states – something the new laws should end.

The overarching intent of the proposals is for a system that allows for intra-EU commercial trade in pre-1947 worked ivory and pre-1975 musical instruments, similar to that which has operated in the UK for decades.

However, as the exemptions proposed by the UK and EU regimes do not directly overlap, this will be an issue for anyone from outside the EU looking to sell or buy in Europe. "For instance," said Maxwell, "objects exempt for UK purposes – such as pre-1918 items of outstanding artistic, cultural or historic significance

or portrait miniatures – would not be permitted to enter the EU for commercial purposes under the guidelines."

'Onerous burden'

Maxwell concluded that although there are some differences, the "increasingly onerous administrative and evidential burdens placed on owners and dealers are similar across both regimes".

In the UK, The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) said in a statement to ATG that "the Government is committed to bringing the ivory ban into force as soon as practicable and we plan to consult on implementation shortly".

Trade associations will be submitting feedback to ensure Defra's procedures for complying with the act are workable and realistic. The Government is believed to be building a database for the items that are exempt under the act and will require registration (notably items comprised of less than 10% ivory by volume made prior to 1947, pre-1918 portrait miniatures and pre-1975 musical instruments comprised of less than 20% ivory).

A system of applying for exemption certificates for items of outstanding artistic, cultural or historic significance also needs to be put in place.

Dodgson added: "There will be many objects in circulation that comprise less than 10% ivory, so it's also really important that government gives dealers and auctioneers enough time to register these exempted items on the database, well in advance of the law coming into force."

Second jug from Ealing Martinware theft returned

A face jug from the Ealing Martinware thefts has been returned – the second piece from the local council's collection to be recovered in recent months.

Sixteen pieces of Martin Brothers pottery were stolen during a break-in at Southall Library in May 2005, with 24 more items taken in March 2007 from Pitzhanger Manor House. Last autumn a bird jar was recovered with the help of art pottery specialist Alison Davey of AD Antiques and Christopher Marinello of Art Recovery International (ATG No 2469).

A 'barrister' face jug, c.1900, taken from Pitzhanger was spotted in early 2020 on eBay by Martinware collector and researcher Nigel Wilson.

Local law enforcement had been unable to recover the piece before the listing was removed, but after the recent publicity over the recovery of a Wally bird in the autumn and a renewed focus on the stolen items, the location of this jug emerged. Marinello, working pro-bono for Ealing Council's museums, negotiated the unconditional return of the piece from a London dealer.

In December, ATG published a list of the outstanding items that include 11

bird jars, six face jugs, a dragon spoon warmer, an imp musician, a model of Pickwick, a queen chess piece and the upper tier of a fountain – all of them easily identifiable. Marinello added: "I am grateful to the *ATG*. Without its press coverage and archive, we would not have got this one back."

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Pick of the week

Pondicherry carpet rescued from the flames

In his book Oriental Rugs (1998), textiles scholar Murray Eiland Jr lamented the challenges in dating and identifying carpets woven in south-east India. "In the 19th century there were a number of carpet centres that are not significant producers now... it is difficult, if not impossible, to identify them with specific carpets."

However, the 21ft 4in x 19ft 8in (6.5 x 6m) carpet offered by Lyon & Turnbull in Edinburgh on February 11 was very probably produced in Pondicherry, c.1860.

Pondicherry, a French territory for three centuries, was known for its Indo-French 'rococo' designs tailored to a Western audience.

In the wake of the impressive examples on display at the Great Exhibition of 1851, a floral chintz carpet such as this would have been the height of fashion for the grandest room in the recently remodelled Penicuik House, Midlothian.

By family repute, it was commissioned or purchased in Pondicherry and brought back from India by Edward Clerk (1824-1917) who was serving with the 4th Madras Cavalry.

He was a younger son of Sir George Clerk, 6th

Baronet of Penicuik (1787-1867) and the carpet a gift for his father.

When in 1878 an artist by the name of Carelli painted a watercolour of the interior of the saloon, known as Ossian's Hall after its painted ceiling by Alexander Runciman (1736-85), the carpet was given pride of place.

Sadly, Penicuik House was destroyed by fire in 1899 – and Runciman's ceiling with it – but a salvage operation did save the majority of the furnishings, including this carpet. It was rehoused in the Clerks' new home in the nearby converted stable block where it spent the 20th century.

By family tradition, there is thought to have been a second carpet, sold sometime in the late 19th century. It may be that an extra 19ft 8in (6m x 70cm) strip section offered as part of the lot came from this

Coin dealer offers civil war hoard

Gloucestershire dealership Silbury Coins is currently offering for sale coins from an English Civil War-era hoard found by a metal detectorist in Ewerby, Lincolnshire in 2016.

The area suffered fierce fighting during the early years of the conflict and it is believed the hoard (with a face value of £34) was buried in 1643.

After processing under the Treasure Act, around 300 coins were acquired by The

Collection Museum in Lincoln with the remaining 800 returned to the finder and sold by Morton & Eden in 17 lots in October last year.

Silbury bought just over 400 coins at the auction (primarily Charles I shillings and sixpences) and will sell them individually at between £100-400 each, together with a printed booklet giving the story of the find.

Shankly inspiration at Liverpool FC sale

Liverpool FC are leaving their Melwood training centre after 70 years and specialist sport auctioneer Graham Budd has been tasked with selling the contents.

His online sale on March 2 comprises 450 lots ranging from photographs of former managers and LFC crests to a training

> whiteboard and lamp and sofa from Jurgen Klopp's office.



Melwood had been the club's training ground since the 1950s and was previously transformed by legendary manager Bill Shankly.

The auction includes black and white photos which hung in

a Liverpool Managers' Gallery at Melwood, with that of Shankly (1959-74) estimated at £200-300 (pictured above)

Although the famous Liverpool FC 'Boot Room' itself was at Anfield, you can get a flavour of that influence through boot racks that stood at Melwood guided at £2000-3000 (below) and £1000-1500. The Boot Room at Anfield was a small room near the changing rooms that stored the squad's football boots. Shankly turned it into an informal coaches' meeting room.

In February 2018 Budd ran an auction in support of the Liverpool Former Players Association in which more than 380 items from the old Main Stand at Anfield went under the hammer.

Virtual avaluated Savaluated Sava

In the absence of face-to-face contact, 2020 was a difficult year for the numismatics market as a whole. But, as *Richard Falkiner* and *Roland Arkell* report, the auction business found a way to thrive



"Throughout lockdown in 2020 the market saw a renaissance, with collectors having more time to spend on their collections. With so much less in the way of leisurely pursuits to spend money on, many collectors also had more disposable income available."

It was these dynamics, observed by Pierce Noonan, CEO of Dix Noonan Webb, that made 2020 an extraordinary period for the London numismatic market.

On one hand, almost no fairs and precious little face-to-face trading took place. On the other, it was a record year for London's auction houses with combined total sales just shy of £53m – a rise of more than 10%. When ATG first published these annual tabulations in 1994 the total was a mere £9.3m (see the updated table on page 12).

Coins, medals and banknotes are well suited to the e-commerce that has thrived in the Covid era. Not only are they portable but they were also made in multiples and can be graded according to an accepted language.

In short, coin auction houses were well-placed to take their sales completely online when the first lockdown was imposed. However, some firms were better prepared than others.

E-commerce transition

Both DNW and Spink chose to increase the frequency of sales, which helped to capture some of the business that was being lost with the closure of fairs and shops.

DNW's medal auctions, previously held quarterly, have been staged monthly since March. The firm made it to second place in the overall tabulation, with a near 4% increase in total sales (despite a 5% drop in number of lots offered).

"Our industry has been fast tracked in a way that was probably inevitable but would never have been achieved in such quick time," said Noonan. "The online revolution resulting from the lockdowns is a legacy that will be with us for many years to come."

Noonan estimates coins and medals increased in value by "around 15 to 20% on average across the board" in 2020.



The online revolution resulting from the lockdowns is a legacy that will be with us for many years to come

As part of its e-commerce transition the Spink coin department rekindled – after a decade-long hiatus – its fabled 'Numismatic Circular' providing regular themed online sales for lockdown-weary collectors. By the end of December, 10 such auctions had offered more than 3500 lots and garnered over £lm.

The department also chalked up a remarkable record: an unbroken chain of five back-to-back 'white-glove' English coin auctions held from late summer into the autumn.

It helps that the rarest English coins and those in good condition are reaching new financial territory.

The Stratos collection of English gold coins coupled with the Ennismore collection of Anglo-Saxon and Viking coinage provided Spink with 'a

once in a blue moon auction' on September 21.

Together the 321 lots took over six hours to clear, generating more than £3m with only one lot failing to sell. "We are at a crossroads where the veteran collector meets the technologically savvy investor, leading to explosive auction results," said Spink.

The firm nonetheless registered a small drop in the year's hammer total in the coins and medals sales held from the London headquarters.

Operating in a number of international markets, Spink points to the success of sales in New York, Hong Kong, Tokyo, Singapore and Switzerland. Globally the firm's numismatic auctions in 2020 reached £17.6m.

Some of the strongest individual prices for English coins were recorded overseas. The record for a British coin sold at auction was broken twice at a sale held by MDC in Monte Carlo on October 29.

Exceptional examples of the 1831 George IV five sovereign piece and the 1839 Una and the Lion £5 pattern – both designs by William Wyon (1795-1851) – were hammered down at €820,000 (£745,500) each.

It is the sign of a vibrant market that a handful of numismatic records have fallen in recent months (see the Brasher doubloon sold for \$7.8m

Detecting an Iron Age record

Not all the best UK numismatic action was in London. On November 15, the first known gold coin of Caratacus – unearthed by a metal detectorist a year earlier in a Berkshire field – sold at auction for a record £71,000 (plus 20% buyer's premium) at Iron Age coins specialist Chris Rudd in Norwich.

Caratacus, king of the Catuvellauni tribe, is one of the few figures that have come down to us from the pre-Roman era – remembered as the freedom fighter who defied and delayed the forces of invasion for eight years. An eloquent speech he gave as a captive in Rome famously led to his pardon.

The Caratacus Warrior stater, so-called as it includes the image of a naked figure on horseback holding a javelin and a shield, with the word *Carat*, was struck at Calleva (modern Silchester in Hampshire) shortly before the Roman invasion of 43AD. The word *Cvno* alongside an ear of barley confirms Caratacus was a son of Cunobelinus, the legendary Old King Cole and Cymbeline of Shakespeare fame, while the Latin inscriptions verso add to the speculation that Caratacus had been educated in Rome.

in Dallas reported in last week's *News* pages, *ATG* No 2479).

London also enjoyed its moments in the sun. Most notably, classical coins specialist Roma Numismatics set a record for any classical coin when a Brutus Eid Mar-type gold aureus, struck shortly after the murder of Julius Caesar, took £2.7m in October.

According to the figures provided to *ATG*, the firm also increased the number of coins lots it offered in London by almost 15% (24,685 versus 21,525 last year), achieving a remarkable total of £17.8m (up 82% compared with 2019). Roma leapt from third to first in the table.

It is worth noting a bigger picture. Much of Roma's merchandise came for sale from overseas vendors – many of them encouraged to sell in London in 2020 by both the draconian 'cultural heritage' laws now operating in parts of the EU and the imminent onset of Brexit.

It remains to be seen if vendors will choose the same route in 2021 given the import duties now imposed on items consigned from outside UK borders. A tax of 5% represents a considerable discouragement to consigners of the best and rarest material.

Record selling rates

Medals and decorations, typically a more localised market, continued to be a strong suit. Spink enjoyed a record selling rate of 98% in this field and registered a record number of new clients.

As ever, quality, unusual and fresh-to-market items offered on behalf of recipients or their descendants flew away. This included both historic awards from conflicts in the 19th and the first half of the 20th century (Morton & Eden's top two results of the year came for Victoria Cross groups of the Indian Mutiny). However, more recent awards that are rare both in terms of the small numbers awarded and the handful available to commerce were also avidly sought.

The table also underlines that the results have not been even. Overall supply was a little down – something to be expected in the circumstances.

Four London auction houses suffered a decline in their reported totals for this past calendar year. So, while Baldwin's of St James's rendered a marked increase in take (up almost 28%), less business was done by Morton & Eden, Bonhams and TimeLine. Sometimes this requires only a simple explanation: in 2019 Morton & Eden sold a rare Islamic dinar for £3.1m and such windfall lots cannot always be repeated.

A newcomer to the market in 2020 was the old established philatelic dealership Harmers – now part of the Bolaffi Auction Group – holding a sale in September with another scheduled for this coming spring. Sovereign Rarities, which did not hold an auction in 2020, also plans a return to the restrum in 2021

Remembering the Frew

The sale of Orders, Decorations and Medals at **Spink** on April 22-23 included this group of 17 – including a DSO and bar and MC and bar - awarded to Air Vice-Marshal Sir Matthew Brown 'Bunty' Frew (1895-1974).

As 45 Squadron's top-scoring pilot for the Great War, Frew gained a reputation for saving his comrades at great personal risk whenever enemy aircraft got onto their tail. Officially credited with 23 aerial victories, his real tally may have been far higher, since he often encouraged junior pilots in his squadron by giving them the credit for

victories which were really his own.

Offered for sale complete with seven flying logbooks from the period 1916-48 and a named Air Vice Marshal's RAF cap, the lot doubled hopes to sell at £35,000.



An Islamic landmark

After striking a few coins in both gold and silver which were still closely related to Byzantine and Sasanian prototypes, 'Abd al-Malik ibn Marwan ibn al-Hakam, the fifth Umayyad caliph, ruling from 685-705AD (65-86H), made a clean break with the pre-Islamic past and introduced a completely new gold coinage in 77H. Instead of the modified crosses and

imperial images found on previous gold issues, his new dinars were purely epigraphic, bearing quotations from the Our'an

This 'extremely fine' gold dinar is a very rare survivor from the first year of a purely 'Islamic' coinage – a type that lasted unchanged until the fall of the Umayyad caliphate. Previously sold by Roma Numismatics in 2017, it took £190,000 at Morton & Eden on October 22.





Welcoming the Ides of March

Roma Numismatics set a new record for a classical coin when a Brutus Eid Mar-type gold aureus, struck shortly after the murder of Julius Caesar, took £2.7m in October.

Made by a military mint travelling with Brutus during the late summer or autumn of 42BC, the coin (best known from around 80 surviving silver denarii) has long fascinated both numismatists and historians.

The simple reverse design contains the three principal elements used to kill a dictator: the pileus or cap of liberty and two daggers of differing design, one symbolising that wielded by Brutus himself on March 15, 44BC, the other that of Cassius, his coconspirator. The legend *Eid Mar* abbreviates Eidibus Martiis – the Ides of March.

Until recently it was thought that the coins in the British Museum and the Deutsche Bundesbank collection were the only two surviving gold



examples of this famous issue. This new discovery has a 19th century Swiss provenance, having descended in the family of the antiquarian Baron Gustave Charles Ferdinand von Bonstetten (1816-92).

The winning bid was more than five times the top estimate and around £3.25m with the 20% premium added

The previous record for a classical coin was a Pantikapaion 'satyr head' gold stater sold for \$3.25m (£2.3m) at the Prospero sale in New York in 2012.








HAMMER MARKET SHARE: Across London's numismatic auctions

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The Regency golden age

The 1826 £5 piece was the highest denomination in the coinage of the George IV and was not issued for general circulation. The epitome of Regency design, the reverse features the royal shield while the obverse designed by William Wyon features the bare head portrait.

Something between 150 and 225 were struck as part of the 1826 proof sets. This example, with only a slight scratch to count against it, sold for £78,000 (estimate £25,000-35,000) when Harmers of London held its inaugural sale at the Westbury Mayfair Hotel on September 24-25.



Comber's Elizabethans

Starting his collection with a 1568 sixpence purchased in Swanage in 1957, marine insurance broker Christopher Comber (1944-2019) formed a remarkable collection of Elizabeth I coins.

The first tranche was offered by **Baldwin's** of St James's in October. Sold well above the

£40,000-60,000 estimate at £75,000 was this Elizabeth I sovereign. A coin such as this, the largest denomination at the time, had huge purchasing power in its day and few entered general commerce or survived the melt.

This one is the best of eight known coins with a rare 'crescent and escallop' mint mark giving it the probable date of c.1587-88, the timeframe of the defeat of the Spanish Armada.

The sovereign has a long collecting history dating back to the sale of the W Talbot Ready collection at Sotheby's in 1920, when it took £20.

It last sold at Sotheby's in November 2000 for £6000 and had been purchased by Comber from Roderick Richardson.

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'Australian' hero of Inkerman

Dix Noonan Webb's highest-priced lot of the year was this Crimean War Naval Brigade Victoria Cross group of four sold for £240,000 on October 15. The estimate was £120,000-160,000.

Seaman James Gorman (1832-82) of HMS Albion was decorated for gallantry while defending the Right Lancaster Battery at the Battle of Inkerman on November 5, 1854. Declining the order to withdraw and leave the position, he worked with four other sailors from the Albion to repel the Russian advance 'not trusting any Ivan to get in bayonet range of the wounded'. The week after Inkerman Gorman distinguished himself again, saving the life of Royal Navy Captain Lushington who had become 'unhorsed and surrounded by the enemy'.

His award was among those mentioned in the February 24, 1857, issue of the London Gazette listing the first ever recipients of the VC. As later in life Gorman would live in the antipodes – boarding the free trader Fairlie at Plymouth, bound

for Sydney, on January 7, 1863 - he is considered the first Australian resident to hold the VC. His medals remained in Western Australia during the sale with the successful bidder asked to pay only when an export permit was granted.





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Feature Coins & medals

An Indian Mutiny double

The Medals, Orders and Decorations sale at Morton & Eden in November featured two Victoria Crosses awarded during the Indian Mutiny. They sold to the same buyer for a combined hammer price

'conspicuous gallantry' during the storming and destruction of the Kashmir Gate at Delhi on September 14, 1857.

Neither medal had been on the market for more than two decades. A total of 182 Indian Mutiny VCs were awarded to members of the British armed forces, Indian Army and civilians under their command.



Stuteville and The Anarchy

This coin, from the period known as 'The Anarchy', was discovered by a metal detectorist in a Yorkshire field in March. It dates from c.1148-52 during the 20-year succession crisis that followed the death of Henry I's only male heir. His choice of queen, his daughter Matilda, was challenged by his nephew Stephen.

The coin was struck in the name of Robert de Stuteville, one of the rebel barons who took advantage of fighting in the south of England to seize power in the north. Custodian of Knaresborough Castle, he also owned the town of Kirkbymoorside, founded the nunneries of Keldholme and Rosedale, and was a benefactor of Rievaulx Abbey.

The silver penny, the first to be found from this era in a century (since 1889) and the first example of its kind at auction since the 1950s, is one of just five Stuteville coins

> known. It shows a medieval knight on horseback brandishing a sword alongside the inscription Rodbertvs d Stv. It was offered for sale at Spink

as part of the firm's Numismatic e-Circular sale on June

26 titled The Penny: From Actium to the Anarchy (31BC-1154AD). Estimated at up to £6000, it sold for £14,000 to a private British collector.





Monarchs conjoined

This William and Mary Five Guineas piece from 1693 (above) features conjoined busts of joint monarchs. They were the first joint rulers in England for over 800 years, although Philip II and Mary I had appeared on English coinage together. This is one of the finest known examples of this short series. It has been graded by the Professional Coin Grading Service as MS62 with only four others receiving a higher rating.

At London Coin Auctions on December 6, it sold at £135,000.

Into the Stratos

This Queen Anne (1702-14) five guineas piece from 1705 sold for **£220,000** (estimate £100,000-120,000) to top the Stratos collection of English gold coins offered by Spink on September 15.

At the time of the Whetmore dispersal in 1943, the 1705 Five Guineas piece was thought of as a 'proof' striking and deemed more valuable than the renowned 1703 Vigo issue.

This example, graded 'proof like', had last been sold by Stack's Bowers Galleries in New York in January 2012 for around \$40,000









Rewriting Mercian history

This silver penny (above) struck for Ludeca, a short-lived king of Mercia who ruled from 826-7, was found at Combe Bissett, Wiltshire, in 2016. It is one of just 10 coins of Ludeca known and the only one with a London mint mark (the others were struck by moneyers in East Anglia).

The coin helped to rewrite Anglo-Saxon history as it demonstrates that the Mercians continued to hold London throughout the 820s, and that the city was not captured by Ecgberht, king of Wessex, until at least after Ludica's death in 827. A unique coin, it was offered by **Dix Noonan Webb** on March 10 and sold at £32,000 (estimate £10.000-15.000).

Token record


A record for a British token was set at **DNW** on May 26 when this copper coin - the only specimen known in commerce – took **£7000** (estimate £400-500). The 1812 half-crown token, issued for Younge & Deakin in Sheffield, has the arms of the city to the obverse (here double struck and off centre) and a seated figure of Justice to the other. Similar silver tokens issued by Younge & Deakin in 1811 are far more common.

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






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Chinese: a here-to-sell strategy

Colchester auction house follows a policy of detailed cataloguing but modest estimates

A trio of soaraway stars – a Mary Beale portrait of her son and two fine Chinese pieces – and enthusiastic bidding on lots from the estate of the late Jane Sumner took the **Reeman Dansie (20% buyer's premium)** January 26-27 sale to unexpected heights.

Some 86% of the 860 lots got away to a hammer total of £604,000 – about two and a half times pre-sale expectations.

Catalogued as '18th century Italian School' and estimated at £400-600, the small oil was recognised as Beale's work and sold via thesaleroom.com at £100,000 (see ATG No 2478), setting a new high for the 17th century English painter.

By contrast, the Chinese items were not exactly sleepers. The policy at the Colchester auction house is to fully describe and illustrate Chinese works of art, give them a here-to-sell estimate then leave matters to the market.

A 7½in (19.5cm) diameter cinnabar lacquer box carved with scholars next to a pagoda had minor losses but was in overall good, original condition, particularly for a piece 600 years old if the six-character Yongle (1402-24) dynasty mark was right.

Bidders clearly thought it was and, against a token £50-100 estimate, it sold to 'an international client' at £95,000.

Early Ming lacquer boxes represent some of the finest decoration found in the Chinese decorative repertoire.

The subject here is probably the 'Four Favourites' depicting the Song philosopher Zhou Dunyi seated on the terrace with two servants. The sides are decorated with composite flower-heads including lotus, camellia, magnolia, hibiscus, chrysanthemum and peony.

The sale opened with the other major Chinese star: a 9½ in (24cm) wide blue and white porcelain 'dragon' box and cover. It bore the six-character Wanli (1563-1620) mark and the catalogue went further than usual in opining that it was 'probably of the period'.

With three firing cracks, minor chips and wear to the glaze commensurate with age, it was in good overall condition. Very modestly pitched at £800-1200,

international competition ensued before it went to a UK buyer at £35,000.

Yew beauty

While most of the 200 furniture lots followed the familiar pattern of once sought-after material selling in three or low four-figures, the section certainly played its part.

Half-a-dozen stand-out items emerged, mainly from the estate of dealer Jane Sumner (see story **right**).

Topping the section was a 6ft 6in (1.98m) wide, early 18th century low dresser that was unusual for its timber – yew.

The dresser had undergone some restoration over the years including a replacement drawer and suffered various small losses and repairs but, estimated at £3000-5000, it sold to a private UK buyer at £14,000.

A second piece from the estate, an early 18th century walnut wing armchair with bowed seat, cabriole legs and tapestry upholstered back, doubled expectations at £4100.

Meanwhile, a 3ft lin (95cm) wide and tall William and Mary oyster veneered chest of drawers with a geometric veneered top went to trade at £9200.

Furniture from other sources

underscored the attraction of oyster veneering.

One was a William and Mary miniature chest of drawers, with an olive wood radially veneered rectangular top and geometric veneered sides.

Measuring just 12½in (32cm) wide, it was in very good original condition apart from the replacement bun feet and, against a £1000-2000 estimate, sold at £7600.

An 18th century and later oyster veneered desk featured an unusual foldover top opening to reveal a tooled leather writing slope and three small drawers. With a cupboard in the kneehole flanked by three drawers to each side, it measured 3ft 6in (1.06m) wide. It had some small veneer losses and replacements, splits to the sides and later bun feet and was pitched at £300-500, but sold to the trade at £4500.

Coming up to date with current fashion, the furniture included half a dozen pieces of 1960s-70s Scandinavian furniture.

Best was an Indian rosewood Danish dining suite by J L Moller comprising a circular extending table and six chairs. Against a £500-700 estimate, it sold to a UK bidder at £2400.

Turpin stands up and delivers

The Reeman Dansie sale included 80 pieces from the estate of the well-known dealer Jane Sumner, who died last September at the age of 82 (see *Obituary, ATG* No 2459).

Sumner and her lifelong partner, the late John Braund, were dealers for more than 50 years, ending their days running Turpin Antiques in Hungerford.

Salisbury saleroom Woolley & Wallis handled the 130-lot, £130,000 offering of Braund's collection in July 2019 and has more than 100 pieces from the sumner estate scheduled for a January sale postponed during lockdown.

Turpin Antiques, however, had its roots in Essex and both partners were long-time clients of Reeman Dansie. As well as the furniture at the January sale (see main story **left**), the late 17th century longcase clock and 19th century toleware tea canisters and covers shown here sparked keen bidding.

The clock is signed for William Grimes who inherited the London

Pitched at £2000-3000, the clock sold to a private bidder at £9500.

The (44cm) tall octagonal canisters with original chinoiserie ornament were stamped *G Sutcliffe, Maker, Manchester* and numbered *23, 27.* Apart from some light dents to the lids and general wear, both were in very good original condition. Estimated at £1000-2000, they sold at £7000.

Glorious Gainsborough result

Although now known as Gainsborough chairs, generous walnut and upholstered armchairs such as that offered for sale by Locke & England (17.5% buyer's premium) in Leamington Spa on January 28 were often referred to by contemporaries as 'French' chairs, as the most elaborate styles were based on French rococo.

This one is carved to the arms and cabriole legs with floral rosettes and acanthus and sits on muscular hairy paw feet. The English or French floral needlework is probably of the period c.1750.

Similar chairs are often linked to the London furniture designer-maker Giles Grendey (1693-1780) based on their close similarity to those supplied by his workshop to several grand country houses, including examples in the collection at Stourhead, Wiltshire.

Auctioneer Richard Gormley described it as "a rare, desirable and honest piece that came from a farmhouse clearance in Warwickshire. The vendor had been happy with the estimate of £3000-5000. However, the interest before the sale made me believe the chair could far better."

The bidding started at £8000 on commission and met further competition between phone lines before going to a UK private collector at £29,000.

Kidney-shape desk

Like Gainsborough chairs, Victorian kidney-shape desks remain hugely

popular pieces of antique furniture.

The example offered by Semley Auctions (22% buyer's premium) in Shaftesbury on January 23 as 'the property of a lady' was particularly fine. Made in burr walnut and tulipwood, it was mounted in ormolu and delicately inlaid to the drawer

fronts with boxwood lines and to the drawer pulls with marquetry floral medallions.

It measured 4ft 4in (1.32m) wide. Offered with a very appealing guide of £1500-2500, the hammer price was £14.000.

'Signature' Stobwasser snuff box at £11,000

Georg Siegmund Stobwasser (1717-76) and his son Johann Heinrich Stobwasser (1740-1829) were among the many craftsmen who moved to Brunswick in the wake of the Seven Years' War.

In its pomp, the 'lacquerware manufactory' founded by Georg Siegmund Stobwasser (1717-76) in Brunswick in 1763 employed more than 50 people creating a wide range of papier-mâché and toleware luxuries. The signature Stobwasser production was the flat circular table snuff box decorated with miniature reproductions of popular Italian, French and Dutch paintings.

They were much imitated, but the best examples are signed inside with a distinctive red script, often with pattern number and sometimes with a subject name. Typically, they were decorated by a succession of talented German artists who learnt their trade at the Stobwasser painting school.

The example offered at **John Nicholson's (25% buyer's premium)** in Haslemere on January 28 was in the top tier of Stobwasser boxes and decorated with a local scene. Measuring around 3½in (10cm) across, it was inscribed inside the cover *Ansicht des Birbaumschen Gartens zu Braunschweig* (View of the Birch Tree Gardens at Brunswick).

It was estimated at £1000-1500 but sold to an online bidder from Germany at £11,000. Such prices are not unprecedented: a similar box offered for sale at Bamfords in Derby last September decorated with a vignette titled *Vue du jardin du Palais-Royal près de la rotond* went to an online bidder from Brunswick for £20,000.

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Auction Reports Hammer highlights

Monk and satyr both prove very good for vendors

Two pieces of sculpture – both catalogued as 19th century copies – made much higher than expected prices in the UK regions last month, writes Roland Arkell.

At the **Dreweatts (25% buyer's premium)** Interiors sale in Newbury on January 27 a 16in (4lcm) alabaster model of a kneeling monk with hands clasped in prayer leapt past hopes of £400-600 to bring £68,000.

It is very much in the French Gothic taste, with enough patination to the surface and old cracks and losses to suggest it might not be simply an exercise in revivalism.

At least two bidders believed this is a 'mourner' from a larger late

devotional group or
tomb - the best-known
example being the 82
figures of similar size
that occupied niches
around the tombs
of the Dukes of
Burgundy in Dijon.

Roman red alert

At Adam Partridge (20% buyer's premium) in Macclesfield on January 21, a 9in (22cm) high red stone bust, catalogued as 19th century, took £17,500 (estimate £100-150). It came for sale from a vendor who had bought it at auction around 30 years ago. Three UK phone bidders made the running.

Sporting chips and old repairs, this was more probably Roman – from the 1st or 2nd centuries when such 'term' heads were used as table legs (*trapezophoros*).

Holes and channels cut to the back of this and other examples support that theory.

The subject, probably taken from a Hellenistic prototype, is Dionysus wearing a wreath of ivy leaves and berries in curling locks with eyes recessed for inlay.

Rosso antico marble appears to have been a popular choice when depicting Bacchic subjects in a Roman villa due to its red wine colour.

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
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Knight might and awesome foursome

Quartet of West Country works featured in the same sale as our £105,000 cover star

The Dame Laura Knight nude study that made £105,000 to lead the latest fine art sale at **David Lay (18% buyer's premium)** – as seen on the front page of last week's *ATG* No 2479 – was by no means the only lot that caught bidders' eyes in Penzance.

The 768-lot auction totalled over £550,000 with an impressive sell-though rate of 92%. Not bad for an event in the midst of a lockdown.

As with other auctions across the country, restrictions meant that no live viewing was held, but the saleroom organised an impressive virtual exhibition via the 360-degree platform artsteps.com.

The auction house said: "It was one of our best-ever sales and David has been trading for over 40 years. It was even better than the heady days of the 1980s antiques boom when he sold a Chippendale bookcase for £250,000."

Wallis work

The sale on January 28-29 benefited from a valuable consignment of four West Country paintings which came from a deceased estate and had previously hung in a Cornish mansion. It was believed that the collection was put together in the 1970s.

The most valuable of the four proved to be Beryl Cook's *Plymouth Market*, reported on the facing page.

Another lot to bring multiple bidders was *Harbour and Ships*, a trademark scene by the Cornish fisherman and artist **Alfred Wallis** (1855-1942).

The 6 x 8½in (15 x 22.5cm) oil and pencil on card depicted a birds-eye view of St Michael's Mount and had been acquired by leading St Ives School collector George Dannatt from dealer Victor Waddington in 1972. Having subsequently passed through the same dealer once again, it was then acquired by the family of the current vendor.

It had been exhibited twice at shows organised by The Arts Council.

Wallis made his earliest works on scraps of cardboard, plywood and odd pieces of paper – examples of which were spotted nailed on a wall by Ben Nicholson and Christopher Wood as they walked passed his house in August 1928.

His primitive seascapes were

It was one of our bestever sales and David has been trading for over 40 years produced from memory, depicting scenes and locations he had observed his whole life, and featured a limited palette due to the fact that he bought his paint from ship chandlers.

This picture appeared to have been completed on what was once the lid of a box. The top edge was slightly torn and a tuck flap had produced a crease toward the lower edge. On one of the labels on the back was an inscription in pencil via Ede – a possible reference to Jim Ede, an early collector and promoter of Wallis' work whose house in Cambridge is now Kettle's Yard gallery.

Despite being a small picture, the subject, provenance and likelihood of it being an early work appear to have roused a number of important players in the market. The estimate of £13,000-15,000 prompted five bidders – a mixture of private collectors and dealers – to book phone lines. It sold online for £28,500 to a private client in London; a solid sum given that it was a small picture even for Wallis, an artist whose output was mostly rather compact.

Simple pleasures

The other two lots from the collection were both examples of the naïve-style paintings of Bryan Pearce (1929-2006), an artist whose technique and subject matter was not unlike Wallis.

A depiction of a fishing boat from 1978 in particular drew competition against a £7500-8000 estimate. It was a rare example of a single boat subject and bidders were attracted to

Beryl Cook market boost: highest auction price for 12 years

The highest auction price for 12 years for **Beryl Cook (1926-2008)** was posted at David Lay's recent fine art sale (also see main story).

The most expensive of four valuable works from a Cornish estate, *Plymouth Market* from 1978 drew strong interest against a £16,000-18,000 estimate and was knocked down at £37,000 to a West Country private collector.

The subject matter was fairly restrained for a work by the artist – without the same focus on bosoms, stilettos or sailors as appears in many others.

However, the fact that it has been suggested that this painting inspired the Post Office advertising campaign 12 years later (using Beryl Cook-style animated characters with Les Dawson doing the

voices) seems to have given it a special appeal to collectors.

The 2ft 3in x 3ft (68 x 91cm) signed oil on board was also a good-sized painting depicting a landmark location in her local area which made it a highly commercial prospect in any case.

In terms of all-time auction prices for the artist, this result falls behind only two works that sold at the same sale at Bonhams in July 2008 - Granny with her Pet Mouse that made £58,000 and The Dolphin that made £55,000.

While fans of the artist would like to see a major institution stage a retrospective of her work, which would no doubt bump up values, the Beryl Cook market still offers something for buyers at almost every price point – fitting for such a popular artist.

More accessible

Original works now routinely command four-figure and occasionally five-figure sums, but limited-edition signed prints can be acquired for sums in the hundreds of pounds. Among such works at the

the simplicity of the work.

The signed 17¼ x 21½in (44 x 55cm) oil on board drew six phone bidders, mostly private clients, but sold at £17,500 to a buyer who has strong Cornish connections. The price stands within the top 10 auction sums for Pearce (source: Artprice by Artmarket).

The following lot was also a slightly unusual composition for the artist: a still-life titled *Turquoise Ginger Jar and Fruit*.

While still-lifes by Pearce are by no means unknown, they do not emerge as often at auction as his pictures of boats and harbours and views of the streets and houses of St Ives, which also tend to command





the higher prices.

The $21\frac{1}{2}$ x $17\frac{3}{4}$ in (55 x 45cm) signed oil on board was dated 1976 on the back. Pitched at the lower level of £4000-6000, it sold at £6200 to a different buyer.

Sweet success


Elsewhere in the sale, two portraits ascribed to John Opie (1761-1807) came from a local client and were offered separately, each with £3000-5000 estimates, but met with contrasting fates.

One titled *Sweet Poll of Plymouth* sold at £4600 to a private buyer on the phone and will be heading out of the county, while the other 'attributed to' Opie and thought to depict the actress Mrs Elizabeth Kemble remained unsold.

The former was a 2ft 11in x 2ft 2in (90 x 71cm) oil on canvas which was in largely decent condition despite some cracking (in particular to an area in the lower part of the painting where some bitumen had been applied).

The subject of 'Sweet Poll of Plymouth' seems to be derived from an old seafaring ballad, although its meaning may have become obscured in the early 19th century as the character of Poll appeared as a subject in some rather louche cartoons.

Bidders may well have been attracted to the fact that a picture with this title was exhibited by Opie at the Royal Academy in 1785.



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Cooper Henderson: years of coaching pay off

As with many professions, artists often choose to specialise in a particular area within their vocation.

For Charles Cooper Henderson (1803-77), it was painting horsedrawn coaches

A good example of his work appeared at Cheffins (25% buyer's premium) of Cambridge.

The 16½ x 2ft 2in (42 x 66cm) oil on canvas depicted a mail coach on a muddy roadway in a wooded landscape. The work was signed with the artist's monogram on the luggage peaking out under the cover.

It came to auction on December 9 from a Suffolk private collection and had provenance to London dealer Richard Green.

Works by Cooper Henderson can be found in public collections including The Courtauld and The Postal Museum in London as well as The Fred Packard Museum and Galleries of British Sporting Art in Newmarket, Suffolk.

Judging by previous auction results, the most commercial works

appear to be the largest and busiest scenes featuring known locations – such as a pair of works showing carriages arriving and returning to the Ascot races that together made £35,000 at Christie's in May 2008.

The picture in Cambridge had similarities to a larger work titled *The Hull to London Royal Mail* that sold, together with its pendant, also for £35,000 at Christie's back in

November 1988. Overall it was in good condition despite the presence of a layer of surface dirt and some insect droppings. At the Cheffins sale, it drew good interest against an appealing £2000-3000 estimate and was knocked down at £6500 to a collector in Germany.

Also drawing attention among a good number of sporting and racing pictures at the sale was a **Peter Biegel** (1913-88) painting of the start of a race at Cheltenham.

An attractive subject that was deemed a well-conceived example of the Hertfordshire-born artist's work, the 15½ x 19¾ in (40 x 50cm) signed oil on canvas came from a local source and drew solid competition against a £2000-3000 pitch, selling at £6000 to a private UK buyer.

Among the Old Master portraits at the sale, a portrait of Lady Mary FitzAlan, Duchess of Norfolk which was catalogued as 'Circle of Hans Eworth (1540-74)' drew bids from a number of parties.

It had previously sold as an 'English School, 16th Century' portrait of an unknown lady' for £20 at Sotheby's back in 1961 where it had

been acquired by a member of the vendor's family.

Estimated at £5000-8000, it took £13,000 from a private UK buyer.

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
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

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Miniature powers up to £1.2m

Work produced in Brussels in the 1530s by a master of illumination soars way over estimate

The stand-out lot in a Sotheby's (26/20/13.9% buyer's premium) sale of Continental books, manuscripts and music that closed on December I was a miniature on vellum, Virgo inter virgines, that made around five or six times the predicted sum at £1.2m.

Produced in Bruges in the 1530s or 40s, it depicts a whole group of 'Virgins among Virgins' in a landscape.

This was a work by Simon Bening, who is widely regarded as the greatest European exponent of the art of illumination - though there were probably contributions by a second artist, said the saleroom.

However, as Sotheby's acknowledges, this exceptional, llin (28cm) tall picture, executed on vellum but laid down on wood, was probably never intended to be part of an illuminated manuscript.

The sale also saw £55,000 paid for an illuminated Armenian gospel book of the early 17th century.

Mozart marvels

The musical content of the sale, included several Mozart lots such as, at £13,000, a scribal manuscript score of Leporello and Zerlina's duet 'Per queste tue manine' from what many regard as his greatest operatic achievement, Don Giovanni, at

£15,000. The printed works on offer included an 1801 first printed edition of the opera's full score.

Published in two volumes by Breitkopf & Härtel of Leipzig, this copy sold at £2800, but in a November 19 sale held by Forum Auctions (25/20/12% buyer's premium) another example had sold at £4200.

Published in Vienna by Artaria in 1785, a first printed edition of

Mozart's Fantasia & Sonata in C Minor sold for £18,000 at Sotheby's.

A corrected manuscript of Mendelssohn's String Quartet in E-Flat major, Op.12, accompanied by a letter concerning the composition that he sent to violinist Ferdinand David in 1830, realised £22,000.

That letter also touches on the composer's love for Betty Pistor, to whom he had intended to dedicate the piece before finding that she was engaged to a Berlin lawyer. David later gave the letter to its original intended recipient.


The lot that opened the Sotheby's sale, an autograph album compiled in the last quarter of the 19th century by Max Kalbeck, a Viennese music critic and biographer of Brahms, sold at £24,000. It contained musical quotations in the hands of Brahms, Puccini, Strauss, Grieg, Saint-Saens and a great many other composers.

Holy order at £25,000

Though incomplete and in a decorative 19th century binding, a very desirable item in the world of early Bibles was among highlights at Chiswick Auctions (25/12% buyer's premium) on December 2.

quarto printing of Miles Coverdale's translation of the Holy Bible which, bound in the 19th century with a 1605 Book of Psalms, sold at £25,000.

A 1997, first paperback edition of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, apparently unread but containing a sheet of the publisher, Bloomsbury's notepaper bearing the author's signature, it sold at £13,500 to an online bidder.



Pioneering sea atlas

Sold for a record **€260,000 (£234,235)** in Hamburg on November 30 was a copy of Lucas Janszoon Waghenaer's Speculum nauticum super navigatione maris occidentalis...

Part of a Ketterer Kunst (25% buyer's premium) sale, this was a 1586 first, Latin text edition of the first printed rutter (or book) of sailing instructions, a work known more familiarly as the Spieghel der Zeevaerdt, or in English language editions as The Mariner's Mirror.

The first printed sea atlas, it contains some 45 double-page engraved charts, all boasting fine contemporary colouring and sometimes heightened with gold. The colouring of some charts is retouched in places, and restoration and repairs are evident in others, said the saleroom, while a few may have been added from another copy.

Having spent many years at sea Waghenaer (c.1533-1606) took up a post ashore as a collector of marine dues in his native port of Enkhuizen, but lost that post in 1582. It was while working at a variety of menial jobs to keep himself financially afloat that he began work on what became one of the most successful maritime publications of the age, and the model for those many sea atlases that followed in the 17th century.













Peanuts: early days unveiled

early versions of the characters created by Charles Schulz for his famous *Peanuts* comic strips.

Sold for a premium-inclusive **\$288,000** (£218,180) in Dallas by **Heritage** in an animation arts sale that ended on December 11, it was used to advertise a booklet that in 1953-54 was made available to fans who wrote to their local paper, enclosing a self-addressed and stamped envelope.

In an earlier sale, one that concluded on November 19, a bid of **\$192,000** (£145,455) secured the oldest *Peanuts* strip that Heritage had ever offered. The famous daily strip had made its debut on October 2, 1950, and the one reproduced top appeared on November 17 that year.

There is no mistaking Snoopy, but who is the boy? It's Shermy, one of the original *Peanuts* characters and Snoopy's original owner.

Heritage's catalogue notes to this lot revealed that Schulz's first group of regular cartoons was a weekly series of one-panel jokes called *Lil' Folks* in 1947. It was there that he first used the name Charlie Brown, although he applied it in four gags to three different boys as well as one buried in sand.

Melbourne under the hammer

A very early coloured litho view of Melbourne formed part of an Australiana sale held on November 29 by dealer and auctioneer **Peter Arnold (18% buyer's premium)** of Prahan, Victoria.

Sold at Aus\$12,500 (£6945), it is based on an original by John Adamson and dates from c.1840.

Melbourne was founded in 1835. By 1851 Victoria had become a separate colony from New South Wales with Melbourne the capital.

Beneath the image is a small numbered key to some of the modest number of buildings then to be found in what is today the second-most populous city in Australia. In the line of those that run back from the river at a point just to the left of the two sailing vessels, I was intrigued to see that one is named as the 'Melbourne Auction Rooms'. Livestock may have been the



principal business, perhaps building plots, but could there have been any art sales?

Sold at Aus\$15,000 (£8335) was a scarce set of eight tinted litho *Colonial Sketches* by ST Gill, published in Melbourne in 1853.

'Bushranger's Flight' is shown here but others include 'Native Corrobboree', 'Kangaroo Stalking', and 'Native sneaking Emu' – the term here referring to hunting.


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Previews Our weekly selection from salerooms

On February 25 Chiswick Auctions will conduct a sale titled The Delighted Eye Part II comprising 20th century art and furnishings from the collection of Allen and Beryl Freer. Christie's sold the core works from the collection last year.

The Freers filled their detached 1960s home in a suburb south of Manchester with pictures. Daughter Dr Catharine Davies recalls:



"There were no empty spaces — pictures were even hung on the sides of bookcases and beside windows. Having a mirror or a cupboard was much more of an issue growing up — that meant a challenge to much-needed wall space."

Much of the collection was assembled on a modest budget. "'Don't run two cars' would be my mother's tip for financing a collection," said Davies.

The sale comprises more than 250 artworks plus over 50 pieces of ceramics and furniture and more than 200 books. Estimates range from £100-2000 with many lots offered without reserve.



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Piste off? Get an art fix instead

With ski season on ice for so many, exhibitions offering snowy scenes could fill in

This is usually the time when alpine enthusiasts get their fix in the mountains. But not this year.

"Each and every day this week my calendar has been kindly reminding me that I should be in Zell am See in Austria, skiing for my friend's birthday," says Glenn Fuller of London gallery Gladwell & Patterson. "If that wasn't cruel enough, mother nature has dumped four inches of snow in the garden just to rub it in."

Unable to get on the slopes this ski season, Fuller has brought his passion for the mountains to the gallery and selected more than 30 traditional and Contemporary pictures under the exhibition title *The Call of the Mountains*.

Russell Flint scene

Among the highlights in the show, which ends on February 21 and is available to view on the gallery's website, is a ski scene by William Russell Flint (1880-1969).

A keen skier himself, the Edinburgh-born artist rarely travelled without his painting kits, executing many of his alpine scenes on skis. *First Tracks*, a picturesque work showing two skiers descending a slope with the feminine grace typical of Flint's women, is priced at £29 500

Alexandre Jacob's (1876-1972) Soleil d'hiver, Gelée Blanche is one of six wintry oils by the French artist to feature. He made his name in the French Salons of the 1920s-30s and is best known for his tranquil depictions of his native countryside.

"Jacob was an absolute master when it came to painting snow and it is fascinating to compare his different works in this collection and how he can, through the expert use of colour, create such different effects and atmospheres," says Fuller.

American-born Impressionist Edward Cucuel (1875-1954) also mastered the wintry look, though his stock in trade were summer genre scenes. *His Winter's Mantle*, depicting a tree in a snowy landscape with a sun-topped mountain range beyond, is priced at £23,000.

A sweeping Scottish landscape depicting Ben More in the southern Highlands at sunset is the most

expensive of a quartet of oils by Alfred de Breanski Senior (1852-1928), priced at £45,000. The artist, who was inspired by John Constable and William Turner, was fascinated by the texture of rock, earth and foliage and would focus on the minute details of a particular plant or craggy rockface. The mountains of Wales and Scotland were Breanski's

Hitting the peaks

Over at John Mitchell Fine Art, the London-based gallery is celebrating its 20th annual *Peaks & Glaciers* exhibition, which takes place online this year from February 18-March 26. The family-run firm also marks its 90th anniversary.

The show covers a selection of over 50 paintings, drawings and vintage photographs capturing the Alps in all seasons. The area is a speciality of the gallery's William Mitchell.

"It would be self-defeating, I feel, not to mention that I do a lot of climbing as it goes hand in hand with my love and understanding of the subject matter," says Mitchell, who has climbed over 40 mountains in the Alps since the late 1990s.

Paintings by the earlier peintresalpinistes – the painters who were climbers themselves such as Alexandre Calame and Gabriel Loppé – combine with a more modern bearing to include two living artists, Giorgio Avanti and James Hart Dyke.

The show also features rare images of the early days in St Moritz by Alsatian photographer Adolphe Braun (1812-77).

A stand-out entry among the paintings is *The Aiguille Noire de Peuterey, Mont Blanc, France* by peintrealpiniste Charles-Henri Contencin (1898-1955). The 2lin x 2ft 5in (54 x 73cm) oil on canvas depicts the infamous Peuterey Ridge on the Italian side of Mont Blanc. "It is one of the classic rock climbs and ranks among the finest on the Mont Blanc Massif," says Mitchell. The work is priced at £17,500.

This year several painters are making their debut appearance in *Peaks & Glaciers*. Among them is Swiss-born artist Samuel Grimm (1733-94) who came to England in 1768 after working in Berne, Paris and Normandy.

The Valley of Haslital, Berner Oberland, Switzerland, priced at £12,500, is from a series of watercolours showing the dramatic alpine scenery between Meiringen and Grimsel and is regarded as one of Grimm's most attractive Swiss subjects. It dates to 1774, making it the earliest original work to feature in 20 years of the gallery's alpine exhibitions.

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Maas makes a move from Mayfair to St James's

The Maas Gallery, well-known specialist in Victorian, Pre-Raphaelite and Modern British pictures, is moving to larger premises in St James's.

The gallery, which has resided in Clifford Street in Mayfair for six decades, will open its new space at 6 Duke Street in April.

The decision to relocate comes after the gallery and its landlord, The Pollen Estate, failed to agree the terms of a new lease, which was up for renewal in September.

"The Pollen Estate would not move on the headline rent," said proprietor Rupert Maas. "It was our only chance to avoid being effectively held to premises - premises that we have been in for 60 years - and paying what we didn't think was a market price."

The move follows a clutch of other West End dealerships, including Shapero and Panter & Hall, that have recently committed to new or larger premises. It is a clear sign the trade is optimistic about the future of central London after the pandemic.

"When we are ahead with the vaccine, I think London is very well placed to be at the front of a market renaissance. Dealers have a backlog of new purchases over the last 18 months they have not shown publicly," said Maas.

The gallery hopes to hold its first exhibition at the new premises in May or June this year.

Firsts online for winter

A sketchbook by English artist and muralist Barbara Jones (1912-78) is among the items for sale at Firsts Online: Winter Edition, run by the Antiquarian Booksellers' Association (ABA).

Offered by York Modern Books for £1750, the undated sketchbook comprises some 26 watercolours, pen and ink and pencil sketches, including several portraits, such as the one shown here, and depictions of farm animals.

London-born Jones attended Croydon Art School and the Royal College of Art where she was taught by Eric Ravilious and Edward Bawden. She went on to become a major contributor to the Recording Britain project during the Second World War and made many murals for exhibitions and ocean liners.

The sketchbook along with over 2000 highlights will be unveiled at 2pm GMT on February 18, with new items added throughout the event until February 23.

Following the success of its online rare book events in 2020 (an estimated

Goldstein Moses discovery

This hitherto unrecorded work by the Jewish painter Morris Goldstein (1892-1965) is offered by the Nonesuch Gallery, priced at £5000.

A 4ft 11in x 2ft 10in (59 x 87cm) oil on canvas, The Rescue of Moses is inspired by a passage in the book of Exodus and depicts Pharaoh's daughter and a maid cradling the baby Moses.

Goldstein won a scholarship to the Slade in 1913 and became part of the avant-garde Anglo-Jewish group the 'Whitechapel Boys' alongside David Bomberg, childhood friend Isaac Rosenberg and Mark Gertler, with whom he shared a studio during the First World War

Into obscurity

But following the death of his father, the artist was forced to leave the Slade to support his family. His contribution to British Modernism vanished into obscurity.

He became an art teacher at the Toynbee Art Club, a hub of the East End Jewish community, and continued to contribute to the Whitechapel Gallery's annual East End Exhibition until 1960.

The artist's son, Raymond Francis, has confirmed the authenticity of this work and



First flurry of French auctions

January proves to be a busy month including 37 sales at the Drouot in a fortnight

While the first weeks of the year are traditionally quiet on the auction front in Europe, France has been relatively active over the past month.

The Drouot auction centre reopened after the Christmas break on January 16 and over the course of the next fortnight held 37 auctions totalling £15.6m including premium. Individual results included a number of French institutional purchases with museums securing seven items via the right of pre-emption.

These sales (and others held outside the capital) included a number of strong Old Masters results for works by Flemish, Dutch and Italian artists.

Pictured and reviewed here is a selection of hammer highlights across several different categories from these first French auctions of the year.

Old Master paintings

A six-figure price was achieved for a work by Pieter Brueghel the younger (1564-1636) on January 29 in a sale at Drouot held by Mathais-Bournazel & Oger-Blanchet (24% buyer's premium).

The 23 x 17in (58.5 x 43cm) signed oil on oak panel, dated to c.1616, which had been in a Brussels family since 1914, depicted a group of villagers eating meal al fresco. It sold for $\pounds 1.02m$ (£927,270), double the

lower end of its €500,000-700,000 estimate.

The same sale chalked up a multiple-estimate price for a portrait of a huntsman reclining with his gun and dogs against the trunk of a large tree that was the combined work of Jean Daret and Nicasius Bernaerts, two artists of Flemish origin.

The 5ft 10in x 4ft 3in (1.8 x 1.3m) oil on canvas is signed and dated 1661. The work has found a suitable new home at the Musée de la Chasse in Paris which secured the painting by right of pre-emption for €290,000 (£263,635).

Pupil of Rembrandt

In Nantes on January 26 the local auction house of Couton Veyrac Jamault (24% buyer's premium including VAT), part of the Ivoire group, sold a biblical Old Testament subject painted by the 17th century

Dutch artist Gebrand van den Eeckhout that had been discovered in a château in Poitou by Bertrand

Van den Eeckhout (1621-74) was a pupil of Rembrandt from the late 1630s to 1645 and the master's influence can clearly be seen in this 4ft 7in x 5ft 8in (1.4 x.1.74m) oil on canvas of Pharoah returning Sara to her husband Abraham.

Signed and dated G.V. Eeckbout. fecit./A.1669 on the second step of the platform where the Pharoah stands, the painting was contested by several overseas bidders before finally selling to an English buyer against Swiss underbidding for €120,000 (£109,090), double the lower estimate.

Unpublished works

At the end of January two unpublished works painted by 17th

century Italian artists went under the hammer in Paris and Toulouse. Both had been authenticated by the Parisian firm of Old Master experts Cabinet Turquin.

The Toulouse painting was a portrait of Cleopatra by the Bolognese artist Guido Reni (1575-1642) which auctioneer Marc Labarbe (19% buyer's premium) sold within estimate at €95,000 (£86,365) on January 28. The 3ft 2in x 2ft 10in (99 x 88.5cm) oil on canvas was a late work by Reni (after 1640) and shows the Egyptian Queen at the moment just before her death.

It was a popular subject with the artist: seven examples are known, this one being a more stripped down variant of a composition now in the Pitti Palace in Florence.

In Paris the following day a counter-Reformation work by the northern Italian, Piedmontese, artist Guiseppe Vermiglio came up for sale at Ader (20% buyer's premium).

It depicts what is known as the Mystic Marriage of St Catherine which shows her with the Virgin and Child receiving a ring from the baby with saints Agatha and John the Baptist.

All three of the saints are identified by their various attributes: a wheel, a palm frond and a lamb. This large work, measuring 5ft 7in x 6ft 5in (1.7 x 1.96m), was probably commissioned by a religious community.

Estimated at €150,000-250,000, it sold for €165,000 (£150,000). ■

Museum moves in to buy

The Cluny Museum in Paris, dedicated to works of art from the Middle Ages, pre-empted two items in a sale of Haute Epoque held by **Pierre Bergé & Associes** (25/21/5/18% buyer's premium) in Paris on January 27.

One of them was of English origin: a small ornament from a horse harness dated to c.1300 formed as a knight on horseback. The $3\frac{1}{2}$ x $4\frac{1}{4}$ in (9 x 11 cm) copper plaque would have been attached to the armour with its armorials indicating the identity of the owner.

The arms on this piece, which had a provenance to a private collection in Morbihan, show it belonged to the first Baron de la Zouche who fought against Gascony alongside Edward I in October 1288.

Estimated at €20,000-25,000, it ended up going to the museum for €44,000 (£40,000). The museum's other purchase at €6200 (£5635) was a 3½in (9cm) high early 16th century lantern-shaped reliquary pendant made in Nuremberg, c.1500.

It contained a scene of the crucified Christ and three knights on horseback with their spears pointed towards him and saints Catherine, Margaret and Christopher.

Major Deco names make big prices

The Gros & Delettrez (30% buyer's premium)

auction of Art Deco held in Paris on January 22 offered works from the collection of a gallery owner.

Furnishings by Jacques Emile Ruhlmann were the financial mainstay of the event, contributing €285,350 which was getting on for half the €675,350 total.

These included a classic example of the designer/decorator's Deco style: a 4ft 11in x 3ft 6in (1.5m x 98cm) *Duval* cabinet on a low rectangular stand from c.1924 made from a variety of exotic

woods such as macassar ebony and burr ash and inlaid with a trellis of ivory fillets. Stamped *Ruhlmann* and with the circular workshop mark, this went just over the upper estimate at €92,000 (£83,635).

The second-highest price of the auction was paid for a pair of cuboid stools which had been attributed to another major Deco era name: Pierre Legrain.

The 18in (45cm) high stools, in red and black lacquer heightened with burnished silver leaf, sold within the guide at €62,000 (£56,365).

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Jug and basin for 'Mylord Bolingbroke'

The auction firm **Peschetau-Badin** (22.5% buyer's premium) is known for holding dedicated ceramics sales and offered a two-day auction of European ceramics at Drouot on January 28-29.

It chalked up a premium-inclusive total of just over €590,000 with 80% of the lots finding buyers.

Jug and basin

Among the top-priced entries at €27,000 (£24,545) was a Sèvres soft paste jug and basin with factory marks and date letter for 1757 decorated with floral reserves on a green ground.

The set, which measures 7¼in (18.5cm) in height and 12in (32cm) in length, had an early English provenance. It is recorded by the factory as having been purchased along with other pieces of Sèvres by Lazare Duvaux on December 24, 1757, for sale to Mylord Bolingbroke (Frederick St John, 2nd Viscount Bolingbroke of Lydiard Park, Wiltshire).

A 7½in (19cm) high early 18th century two-handled Chantilly bottle cooler sold for €9000 (£8180).

Like many pieces produced in this factory, its decoration was inspired by Kakiemon porcelain, a design in this instance based in part on an engraving by Jean Antoine Fraisse from his Livre de desseins chinois tirés d'après des originaux de Perse, des Indes,

de la Chine et du Japon of 1735.

Among the lots offered on the second day, one of the highest prices was paid for a substantial 20in (52cm) high white-glazed French faience bust of Louis XV dressed in armour attributed to the factory of Pont-aux-Choux or Lunéville. It sold for £0,000 (£18,180).

Among the ceramics from other

European factories was a decorative 6½ in (16cm) high 18th century polychrome enamelled porcelain figure of a seated magot from the Venetian Cozzi factory.

Not in the best condition, being broken into several pieces and with chips and a restuck hand, the estimate was set at €1200-1500 but it ended up selling for €6500 (£5910).



Olympic torch could burn bright in Brittany

A sale to be held by Jack-Philippe Ruellan in Vannes in Brittany on February 27 will feature this Olympic torch from the 10th Winter Olympics held in Grenoble in 1968.

The 2ft 5in (76cm) long torch, decorated with three official badges designed by Roger Excoffon, comes from the family of one of the members of the Organising Committee for the Olympic Games who participated in the organisation of the Grenoble Games.

Estimate **€30,000-50,000**.

On March 23 Christie's France, in association with booksellers Jacques Quentin (Geneva) and Benoît Forgeot (Paris), will offer the first part of the poetic library of Jean Paul Barbier-Mueller.

Billed as the most comprehensive collection on French poets from the second half of the 16th century and formed around the works of Pierre de Ronsard and other members of the French Renaissance group known as La Pléiade, the collection has been assembled over half a century and today numbers around 800 books.

Among the works on offer in this first sale, which features nearly 130 works from the collection, will be this copy of Ronsard's $Les\ Hymnes\ -$ a first edition of the first and second books, 1555 and 1556, in a gilded and decorated and vellum binding from the period.

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

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

Memories of saleroom life as a lowly porter...

MADAM - Christopher Howe's reminiscences and observations ('Auction Giants Sotheby's and Christie's have turned this multicolour business into beige', *Letters*, *ATG* No 2478) bring back happy memories.

While I was fortunate enough to have had the benefit of being born into a family long established in the trade, I count my teenage period as a 'student porter' at Christie's as among my most formative.

While a handful of the passionate connoisseurs who made up the specialist departments in those days remain, regrettably their position appears much diminished.

I will always remember the ecstasy in the porcelain department when a pair of ormolu-mounted Chantilly magots arrived in the warehouse; sales of 'Fairings, pot lids and Staffordshire figures' overseen on the floor by the much-teased Albert Watts; avoiding the eye of Jim Taylor, the ferocious foreman porter, when heavy marble slabs had to be carried

up the stairs in King Street; my first purchase, as a porter, of an unsold Chinese gouache of a shoe-seller (which I still have); my first conscious exposure to 'Art Nouveau'; the short-sighted auctioneer who always had to have bids pointed out by the clerk (at that time the inestimable Ray Perman), and so much more – including the pub most lunchtimes.

Each week there were daily sales ranging from those with thin, unillustrated catalogues to 'Fine' sales with larger catalogues, and rarely 'Important' sales with many illustrations, some even in colour!

Once in a blue moon, there was a 'Highly Important' sale. I forget the exact order, but certainly Thursdays were for furniture and Fridays for

paintings. This was five a five-daya-week opportunity to look, see and handle hundreds of objects in a multitude of disciplines – you could not help but learn

We lowly porters stood, anonymously in our green coats, in 'block outs' (a square of flat-topped show cases) where we handed over objects to be examined, mainly, by the trade. But here was a wonderful opportunity to learn as experts poured over, say, a Chelsea figure or silver teapot, commenting on its design, weight, colour and condition.

Tricks of the trade

And one noted the tricks of a trade. The comment 'oh, I don't much care for this' might a day or so later be followed by active participation in the bidding at the horseshoe table that surrounded the rostrum.

Friendships were made in those days that remain, including with some of those on the front counter, now sitting in the boardroom.

I remember, in the pre-paddle,

pre-registration, pre-phone days one particularly effective auctioneer smiling as I showed reluctance to bid against a reserve: 'one more bid and its yours, Martin', and so it was, Duncan

The old partners were there every day overseeing the well-being of the firm and its staff ('Mr Guy' leaning over the balcony watching out for late arrivals); turkeys were handed out at Christmas and the name of the rival 'up the road' was sometimes gently 'spat' rather than spoken, but all with a dignified civility and humour.

And there was the wonderful coming together of the trade and auction houses in 1973 for 'Fanfare for Europe' when we joined the European Economic Community.

Christopher is right: we cannot turn the clock back. But it does no harm to recall that not all the changes are necessarily for the better.

Magna Carta medal puzzler

MADAM - Re 'Magna Carta Shines in Silver', *Auction Reports*, ATG No 2476.

I had to admire the fine silver tableau depiting the signing of the Magna Carta by King John, modelled by George A Carter, sold in December 2020.

However, I couldn't help but think that the artist might have been greatly influenced by a medal produced by Peter van Abeele, c.1650, one of which I have in my possession.

You may note that the group involved with the presentation of the Magna Carta is structured in a very similar manner to that of the granting of Arms to the City of Amsterdam, as depicted by van Abeele on this medal. Both share

a tiered platform, a similar balance of figures, a dog and a page boy.

In the event that Carter might have used Van Abeele's medal as a basis for his depiction in any way, to my mind it would take away the originality of the work. However, both parties could have been influenced by an earlier painting. Or perhaps Carter's similar projection of his work might have been simply a coincidence.

Food for thought, though – I wonder what your readers might think.

Brexit makes single trade body a vital step

MADAM – It will come as no surprise that I, for one, wholeheartedly support the proposal from Kaye Michie (see *Letters & Opinion*, *ATG* No 2479) that the two antiques dealer associations, BADA and LAPADA, should be merged.

I resigned from BADA over its part in *The Open Art Fair* last year.*

The arrangement between BADA and the fair is, in my view, symptomatic of a broader loss of direction within the association, as membership has aged and retired and the business has changed so dramatically.

There are many good people within the association and the BADA office has employees of high calibre but it is high time for change and the formation of a single association for

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antiques dealers.

One set of challenges will be to support dealers in trading to and from the EU. Until this year, as members of the EU, we had a significant price advantage arising from the global and margin VAT schemes.

That has now gone and EU customers buying from the UK now have to pay full VAT on import. I have already lost several sales as a consequence.

Moreover, I note that German customs are insisting on delaying imports while they physically inspect them and are demanding import licences for antiques.

There is also the absurdity that the UK and the EU no longer recognise their respective hallmarks on silver and gold. There are agreed Common Control Marks with some EU countries but not all.

In theory, antique pieces of precious metal with hallmarks should be recognised by the various countries but that does not seem to be working out in practice as yet. In responding to all the challenges of Brexit, the pandemic and changes to trading in general there needs to be change in the way that antiques dealers are represented – a single, more powerful, and truly representative organisation is surely the future.

MADAM – There is some hope for a replacement to the regrettable but understandable Covidrelated closure of the Christie's archives highlighted by the trade associations and the letter (shown **right**, *ATG* No 2476) from Mike Sanderson.

Although there
are many databases
of auction results, there
are none which provide scans of the
complete catalogue including the
essay, provenance, exhibition history,
and publications. This is increasingly
important to valuation, title and
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40,000 complete catalogues of the major houses and these will be made available later this month. They are searchable by artist, date of sale etc, but not yet fully digitised/edited to be searchable by all the obvious criteria of ownership, title, exhibition, provenance etc. That will be phase 2 into 2022.

We have brought forward the core elements for immediate access to compensate for Covid-19 restrictions on office and library access.
