List of Communion Plate stolen from safe on the night of 14/15 April 2023

Notes

The contents of the safe were physically checked as part of the annual check of the Inventory by Hilary Goodinge and Michael Quinlan (churchwardens) and Simon Lathwell (verger) on 30th March 2023. The list of items stolen is taken from the Inventory with photographs and physical descriptions provided by Mrs Gabrielle Young of Heirlooms Antique Jewellers on 24th June 1993. These are referenced HAJ01 etc.

Items 6, 7, 21 and 22 are communion silver from St Nicholas Church Arne which are kept in the safe at Lady St Mary's Church as this church does not have a safe of its own. These are described in a separate document and referenced SNA01 etc.


Items 9 and 23 are communion silver from St Martin's Church, Wareham which are kept in the safe at Lady St Mary's Church as this church does not have a safe of its own. These are referenced HAJ09 and HAJ23.

Definitions:

- Chalice is a cup used for holding Communion Wine.
- Ciborium is similar to a Chalice but normally has a lid and is used for holding Communion Bread or Wafers.
- Paten is a plate used for distribution of communion wafers.
- Offertory Plate is a larger plate used for holding the monetary collection at services.
- Flagon is a jug-shaped vessel used for holding wine or water for communion.
- Pyx is a small box used for holding communion bread to be taken to the sick.

Maker: M. (Unable to identify maker as all records at Goldsmiths Hall were lost in Great Fire of London 1666.) HAJ08.




Chalice. Silver with applied mercurial gilding. In the medieval style. Comprising of: Hexafoil base on raised hollow repousse foot. Ball and rope decoration around base. 5 panels of scrolling floral motifs and one panel with applied quatrefoil granulation beads. Centre cross with each terminal set with a round cabochon-cut garnet (carbuncle). Featuring a central cross with each terminal set with a cabochon-cut garnet. Surmounted by a frieze of chased fleur-de-lys. Knop of boss form set with 6 x cabochon-cut garnets. Conical plain cup within a calyx of 6 leaf frieze. Maker: J.J. & Co. Birmingham Assay Office hallmark for 1868. Approximate weight: 12 oz. Bowl: 9cms wide. 17cms high. Foot 11.5cms wide.

Engraved: Given to the Church of St. Nicholas at Arne in the Isle of Purbeck by a churchman. Roman Initials: MDCCCLXXIII (for 1873). SNA01.




Silver Ciborium with lid. Top of bowl decorated with seven scallop shells. Decorative cross on top of lid. 16.5cm high overall, 13cm high without lid. Base and cup both 9cm diameter. Inscription round the rim of the base states: 'Presented to St Nicholas Church Arne in thanksgiving for the Wareham Parish Pilgrimage to Santiago da Compostela 1999. Hallmarks indicate that it was manufactured in England in 2000. Other hallmarks include the number 925, a capital 'Z' (with a horizontal line across the centre of the diagonal), the initials 'JS' and an animal head (possibly a cat) with eyes, ears and mouth visible.
